We've just ended a pretty exceptional year, and I want to take this opportunity to thank all those who made it possible.

Thanks to our tutors, staff and learners, TLG achieved its best year in five years for the number of learners served. That's a great credit to the dedication of our tutors, the ingenuity of our staff to develop programs responsive to the needs of our communities, and to the enthusiasm and perseverance of our learners.

Thanks to the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development as well as United Way Waterloo Region Communities, TLG is enjoying a solid financial footing. Together with our fee-for-service programs, these revenues allowed us to invest in new technology and materials for use by our tutors and learners.

Thanks to our partners the Lead Kings, our event sponsors, and our fundraising committee plus dozens of volunteers, we had a spectacular *Rodding for Reading* event last June – our all-round best year ever for the number of participants, the funds raised and just as important, the weather!

Behind the scenes, TLG staff and the Board of Directors continued to implement the ideas we identified as part of our strategic plan, including some opportunities identified in focus groups held with our tutors. This work is important to keeping TLG strong and effective for the learners we serve and the volunteers who work with them.

I'll close by thanking two Directors who are stepping down from the Board. Cathy Skeen returned to TLG in 2014 and over the past four years served as Vice-President, helped develop our communication strategy and materials, volunteered with *Rodding for Reading*, served on our nominating and succession planning committees, and helped organize our *Finders Keepers* sale. Debbie Ackroyd came to TLG three years ago when we sought her out for her expertise in human

I am happy to report on the financial affairs of The Literacy Group of Waterloo Region for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2018.

In the fiscal year, we welcomed Chris into his new role which he has taken and made it his own. We have seen The Literacy Group grow and become more agile in our delivery.

The Literacy Group will continue to monitor costs as fundraising and donation revenue are difficult to project. The Literacy Group continues to strive for sharing our knowledge base within various programs and opportunities within the region.

As a result, the overall surplus of the year is \$2,445 with a fund balance at year-end of \$108.663. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of The Literacy Group of Waterloo Region

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Literacy Group of Waterloo Region, which comprise the statements of financial position as at March 31, 2018 and March 31, 2017 and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the years ended March 31, 2018 and March 31, 2017, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained in our audits is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Literacy Group of Waterloo Region as at March 31, 2018 and March 31, 2017 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

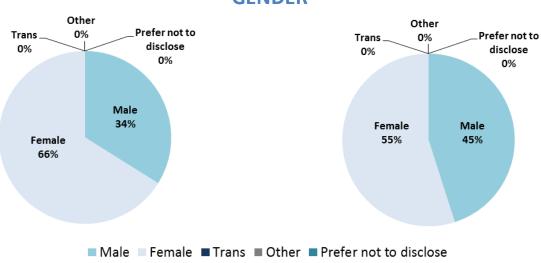

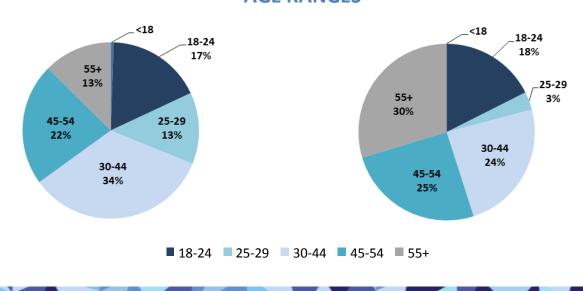

AGE RANGES

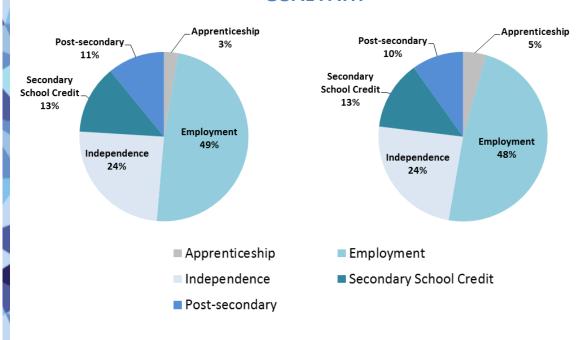

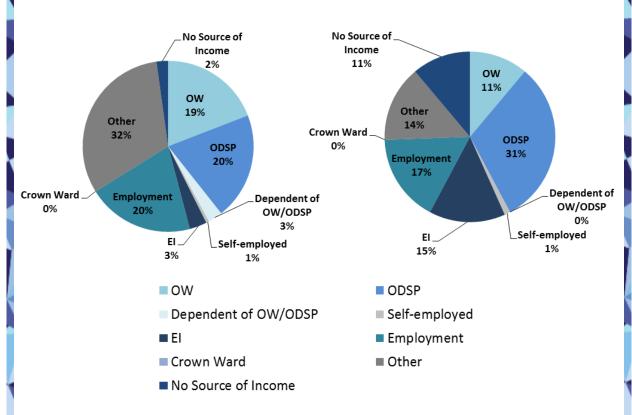
